Executive Director Year-End Report

We Are a People of Hope

The past several years have been challenging to say the least. The global pandemic has had profound effects on our day to day lives, and this includes significant changes to our lives together in our schools and as a school community. Despite these challenges, however, God has continued to bless Edmonton Christian Schools and we continue to see His spirit at work in all three of our schools and in the lives of His children. I have been encouraged throughout the past two years by the constant examples of the Christian program (Teaching for Transformation) taking place in our classrooms, schools, and broader community. God is with us, and He is at work advancing His Kingdom!

Major Themes of 2021-2022

The Global Pandemic: COVID-19 has continued to be the dominant factor affecting schooling in 2021-2022. Student and staff illness, cohorting of students, enhanced hygiene and sanitation protocols, heightened stress and anxiety (students, parents and staff), cancellation of "normal" activities, have all taken a heavy toll. Most of us are feeling stretched very thin, and our capacity to deal with one another with grace and kindness is perhaps not where we would like it to be.

As a Society, we have continued to support the mental and spiritual health of students, staff and families by providing additional resources like a full-time Mental Health Therapist (Jacqueline Boschman), Pastoral Care Leaders (Pauline Klok and Hillary Andermatt), and by offering free community presentations (hosted by Christian therapists) on topics like Anxiety Care in Anxious Times and How to Prepare Yourself and Your Child(ren) to Graduate and Enter Adulthood.

It is our Deep Hope that as our situation begins to normalize, we will be able to regain much of what was lost or damaged during the past two years, and that we can do so as a grace-filled community united by our faith and the unfailing love of our Creator.

West School Building Project

The West School building project wrapped up during 2021-22, including the completion of the maintenance garage, the demolition of the McQueen school building, and the (virtual) Dedication Celebration that we held this Spring. With the gradual lifting of restrictions, we have begun to see this wonderful facility being used as it was intended, and the feedback so far from both students and staff has been very positive. Thank you to everyone who has supported this project financially and helped to make it a reality.

Hiring a Director of Development and Admissions

In September 2021, Keith Piquette joined our team as the Director of Development and Admissions. Keith was formerly a pastor in the Alliance Church, and he and his family relocated from Ontario to join the ESCE team. Keith has been working hard to bring the areas of admissions and especially development into the future so that we can sustain growth and adapt to our changing world.

In admissions, Keith developed a New Family Information Session to set expectations for prospective families. Eight sessions were hosted with 140 families in attendance. Calls were made to welcome first year families and collect feedback. Our enrolment projections for September 2022 675 at North East, 550 at West, and 260 at the High School.

Keith's impact in development has been significant in his first year. Our fundraising goal was exceeded by \$72,000 this fiscal year, the in-person auction was a success, a new donor management database was implemented, and a new three-school community building fundraising event has been planned for September.

In addition to this, Keith has been busy getting to know our supporters and building relationships with community members. He is keen to keep God at the center of the work he does, and we are pleased to have him on the team.

Refugee Sponsorship Project

This year, the Society decided to sponsor two young men from Ethiopia who are family members of a staff member at ECHS. The community rallied to raise the funds necessary to submit a sponsorship application, and a sponsorship committee is working hard to prepare and submit the application. This is a project that could potentially take several years to complete. Your prayers that the process goes well and that the two young men remain safe are coveted.

CRA Court Update

In October 2021, our dispute with the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) re: the receipting of Christian Program fees was heard in court. The case appeared to go well, and we are awaiting a ruling from the Judge. If we are successful (and the CRA does not appeal the ruling), parents would be able to claim a portion of their Christian Program fees and receive a tax credit. We continue to await a ruling from the court.

Looking Ahead to 2022-2023

Enrollment Growth

We praise God that our enrollment continues to be very strong. Our schools are bursting at the seams with students learning about God's story, which is exactly why we built them. We love to see our schools as close to capacity as possible, but are also saddened when we must turn some families away. Unfortunately that was the reality this year, especially when it came to certain classes that had particularly high demand. We are encouraged to see a very strong desire for families to attend our schools and a high retention rate for those already enrolled. God has truly blessed us in this area.

Northeast Site Redevelopment Project

We continue to be troubled by the issue of poor drainage at the NE site. However, our God is the great redeemer so we believe that He can turn this curse into a blessing. Plans are well underway to use the drainage problem as an opportunity to redesign the entire site surrounding the school into a thriving area for outdoor learning and activity. Not only will we improve the drainage, we will transform our outdoor space to bring enrichment to the students.

In a recent presentation by one of our teachers, the staff were taught how outdoor learning is proven to increase the engagement of students, especially those who struggle to learn in a traditional classroom environment. How amazing it will be to see students outside enjoying God's creation and worshiping the creator.

Plans are well underway, and once a final design is reached, we will begin a capital campaign to raise money for the project.

West School Roof Repair

The West School roof in the division one wing, which was the existing structure we retained during the building project, is now in need of a new roof. The age of the roof combined with the above average freeze/thaw weather conditions in the last year has impacted the integrity of the roof. The expansion team did look at the roof during the building of the west school and, at the time with the information they had, felt there was over 5 years of life left; however, that hasn't been the case. Major repairs must be completed to avoid further temporary fixes.

New Hire, Director of Learning

We are excited to share that the Society has hired a new Director of learning to support and grow the Christian Program across all three schools. The new Director of Learning is Maureen Vaags-Nyhof, a 29 year veteran educator with a wide range of experiences across K-12. Maureen was an early adopter of the Teaching for Transformation model of Christian Education and brought this to Calvin Christian School in Winnipeg, Manitoba. Maureen will join our team in mid-August, and we are excited to begin our work with her.

About Maureen

Maureen attended the University of Winnipeg where she completed her Bachelor of Education. She



started working at Calvin Christian School in Winnipeg as a Grade 4 teacher and eventually became Teacher Librarian and Vice-Principal. She completed a Master of Education in Humanities and Social Sciences in 2004. In 2014 she moved with her family to Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan where she has been the Student Support Teacher and Literacy Coach at Cornerstone Christian School.

Maureen loves reading and is passionate about fostering a love of reading in students; so much so that she named her first daughter Reid! She has two more daughters, Reagan and Callen. Maureen loves travelling all over the world with her husband, Paul Nyhof, and

her girls, but Mexico is her favourite place to visit.

Maureen is very excited to step into the role of Director of Learning to support and further develop the established foundation of Christian Education at Edmonton Christian Schools.

Budget 2022-2023 - Executive Summary

- 1. Strong demand signals highest-ever attendance at over 1,490
- 2. First-ever Director of Learning in place for 2022-2023
- 3. Roof repair required for West elementary school
- 4. Establishment of capital maintenance reserve fund

Student Enrolment

- Projecting record enrollment at ~1,485 students for Kindergarten to Grade 12
- Represents growth of 3% from this year and reflects strong demand for Christian education
- Elementary & junior high classes are effectively at maximum capacity (675 students at NE; 550 West)
- High school enrolment is estimated at 260 total(grade 10 is at 97 students; our target is 100 Grade 10s)
- Students enrolment for this and last year were 1,442 & 1,439, respectively
- Christian program fees for the upcoming school year include a 5.0% rate increase

Repairs, Maintenance, and Improvements

Budget 2022-2023 includes \$300k for repairing the west section of the pre-existing West building:

- Covers the classrooms for Kindergarten to Grade 3
- Major repairs must be completed to avoid further temporary fixes

In addition to roof repair, maintenance budget of \$458k includes:

- Implementation of Hippo CMMS software to improve maintenance planning & execution
- Replacement of exterior doors at NE Junior High School
- Grounds maintenance for playground at West school
- Flooring improvements including High School gym
- Various heating, plumbing & electrical projects

Capital Maintenance Reserve Fund

- Budget 2022-2023 includes the initial established of a capital maintenance reserve account
- Initial funding of \$200k represents 6% of overall cash receipts
- Building Committee responsible for approving critical maintenance spending
- Fund is seen as critical given maintenance problems experienced over the past two years
 - Allows Society to properly resolve issues rather than temporary patch-work solutions
 - If unused in 2022-2023; will address again in Budget 2023-2024





Learning in the Time of COVID - Together at a Distance

Successes

We are grateful that things have gone smoothly as we transitioned back to an entire year of in person learning and our students and staff had the opportunity to be in community. This school year parents had the opportunity to choose either on-line or in person at the start of the year and again at the halfway point. The vast majority of our families chose in-person learning for their children this year.

We have appreciated the trust that families have placed in us and our communities' adherence to our protocols. Communication has been key to mitigating risk in our schools and we are grateful for the partnership that we have with our families in keeping our community safe.

Challenges

This school year continued to challenge us as we dealt with the 4th and the highly transmissible Omicron 5th waves. All of our schools had protocols that had to be implemented and additionally we also faced our own unique situations where real-time decisions had to be quickly made in each school community. All of our decisions were made in light of our number one priority - keeping students in person at school with their usual teachers and support staff. Often when staff members were away due to illness, there were no supply personnel available to come and cover, particularly support staff and custodians. Our staff teams deserve an incredible amount of thanks and appreciation for how they always put the needs of our students first and did whatever it took to ensure learning continued.

Our community is very involved in supporting our schools and our families are used to having more access to our buildings. For most of the school year parents and volunteers did not have the usual opportunities to come help in their children's classrooms, attend assemblies and connect with staff. This spring, restrictions eased and some normalcy returned with events like assemblies and field trips being permitted. Our deep hope is that the next school year will include our usual school events and activities.

Farewells and Graduations

As we plan for our end of year celebrations and Graduation activities we are currently planning to celebrate important events. Our school communities are looking forward to celebrating the transitions and accomplishments of our students with Kindergarten grads, grade 9 farewells and our high school commencement ceremony and banquet.

Deep Hope

As Administrators, Our DEEP HOPE for our staff was that they have time, space and support to reflect on and collaborate with colleagues with the primary goal of inviting, nurturing and empowering students to play their part within God's unfolding story of redemption. This Deep Hope has become even more meaningful as we consider the important work we are doing during this uncertain time. What we do have as Christians, is hope. We have an opportunity now to be hopeful, to learn from our experiences, to bring the best part of the past forward and be more present in the future. To play our role in God's story in ways that we have not considered before. In ways that show love to each other and serve the world. This is our hope for our community.

Teaching staff at all 3 campuses are continuing their collective work on Teaching for Transformation (TfT) core practices:

Core Practice #1 - Storyline Core Practice #2 - Biblical Throughlines **Core Practice #3** - Real Work, Real Problems, Real Audience through Formational Learning Experiences (FLEx)

Teaching for Transformation & FLEx Activities

Grade 4 is making classroom garden boxes out of recycled wood crates. We are using the construction room with help from our high school construction class & teacher. This combines our waste in God's world and plant growth/change units.

Division 2 has participated in 2 division-wide flex projects. One project we did was called Love Bomb, where each grade (4,5,6) wrote a note of encouragement and blessing for a class in division 1 and 3 as well as office staff members. Then one morning we put treats on each person's desk and a note on the board for them to read together. The other project was called Restoration Trees where the grade 4 students made 4 trees from recycled materials gathered from division 2 classrooms. Then prayers were put on the trees and they were used to have restorative conversations to resolve recess or classroom conflicts between students. The trees were also used as a space where students could go to have a quiet moment with God to ask for peace or strength for the day.

This year **Division 1** made a thank you banner with notes and treats for the nurses at the Royal Alexandra hospital for Valentines Day. They also organized a food drive for the food bank. We are planning on doing some type of used book sale near the end of this school year.

Grade 2 are collaborating on a creation care FLEX with our bug unit coming up later this spring.

Grade 1 at Christmas sang songs for and with the seniors at McQueen Place virtually, using Google Meet. All of our unit studies are done through a TFT framework. For example, when we learn about groups, we start with God creating Eve because it was not good for man to be alone. God created us to live in groups. We also acknowledge that because of sin in the world, we sometimes experience difficulty in groups. We need to learn to solve problems in groups and to be a positive member of a group. We spend all year learning to be community builders. At Christmas we learned about various traditions and talked about why people have traditions. We learned how each of the popular Christmas traditions helps us to celebrate the birth of Jesus. As we study seasonal changes, we talk about how God has created the world in a masterful way and is caring for his creation through the changing seasons. When we learn about the history of Alberta, we talk about how God has cared for the needs of people in the past and continues to do so in the future. Students reflected on big and small changes that they have experienced in their own lives, and how

God had been faithful to them through all the changes. Next we will study the needs of living things and how living things are interdependent, and again spend time marveling at how God has created the world in such an amazing way.

Grade 1 Learn to love...love to learn project: I have videos on Seesaw that capture our outdoor learning experiences this year. We have been doing these afternoons all year to foster teamwork (learn to love), love for God's world and to foster a love for learning. FLEX: fall teacher convention: students came up with a service project at home and completed it and we reflected on our work at school. Earth Day: cleaning up trash

High School English grade 12: Teaching Othello -- I told my students that while it may seem like the ultimate anti-community building play, it actually is a perfect example of a Creation, Fall, Redemption, Restoration story. It starts out with things as they should be in a perfect world -- no racial or age or gender divide -- then things fall apart with terrible consequences by the insidious effects of lies and gossip and misplaced trust. But there is redemption and the hope of restoration: Shakespeare says that only mercy, grace and forgiveness can heal the hurts and provide hope going forward.

High School English grade 10: TFT - lesson reflections on the key understandings for each class / assignments and perspectives for a new novel. Flex - a student-led refugee educational powerpoint, parent letter, student council presentations, and class to class presentations preparing for a 5 day campaign for raising funds.

High School Band: We started a project focusing on the power of music with individuals suffering from memory loss. We discussed that during the last few years of people feeling isolated from their regular communities (especially seniors that we know), we can use our music to encourage and bring joy to others. Students interviewed seniors in their lives to find out their favorite songs and then researched the history behind the song and the musician. Our next step of the project is to learn the songs that were selected and provide a recording of our class performing them, as a gift to the person that was interviewed. The majority of the songs selected were classic hymns such as "Great is Thy Faithfulness," "Amazing Grace," "How Great Thou Art," and "What a Friend We Have in Jesus."

High School Comtech 10/20/30- have the opportunity to create signage (scripture/practical signage for school) - real need/broader audience etc.

High School Religious Ethics: recently did research projects on a question they chose about the Bible that interested them based on McDowell's 77 Frequently Asked Questions about the Bible and were encouraged to interview pastors/youth leaders/family members as part of their research over Spring Break and ask them their question. They presented their research and findings in small groups. This helps them not let their doubts be dead ends and actually utilize networks to walk through tough faith questions/gain confidence in their apologetics. One student did video interviews with pastors from his church.

High School World Religions: This class always does faith interviews, where they interview someone who is older/mature in their faith about their testimony and challenges they have faced. Sometimes this is the first time students have discussed their parents' or grandparent's faith in this way and they often have valuable learning and reflection acknowledging they had no idea of the depth, challenges or rationale of the person's faith.

High School Math 10C - Trigonometry clinometer lab in which students created posters to share their process and results (Beauty Creating). Math 20-1 - Quadratics "Whodunnit" activity in which students used their developing skills to solve a mystery (Order Discovering). Math 20-2 - Statistics in Edmonton (annual homelessness survey) activity in which students analyzed, reflected on and brainstormed solutions to our current situation (Justice Seeking). We talk about Order Discovering almost every day as that is what we're primarily doing in math. I also exclaim the beauty of the big, juicy multi-step questions we tackle together. To stand back at the end of a full page, solve and examine the beauty of the patterns, processes and eventual result. Ahhh math!

High School Foods 20/30 has blessed the Parkland Tri-Region pay it forward organization with cookie bouquets and a CALM class wrote personalized notes for each one. These were gifted out with a warm meal to the homeless living out in the bush west of our city. Many of them were touched that someone thought of them for Valentine's day and to write a note was special as they haven't received anything personalized in years. This group of students also made 170 hand cut and decorated sunflower cookies for the art show at Northeast School as part of their fundraiser for relief efforts in the Ukraine. Many students used their spares this week to ensure they were completed and looked professional.

Grade 1 - In February for 100's Day we collected soup cans to use for our counting, sorting and graphing and then brought them to the food bank; In December we collected chocolate bars, rice krispy squares, hot chocolate and candy canes. We made about 150 treat bags and wrote Christmas cards for all of them and brought them to the Mustard Seed/Mosaic Center; In December we made penguin Christmas cards for the community; In April, with Gr 2/3 & 25 we collected \$500 worth of

underwear for the Mustard Seed/Mosaic Center which was auctioned off at the ESCE Auction; In April we wrote letters to support people in our community who needed a bit of cheering up.

Grade 5 - In Grade 5 we have been working with mind maps (webs using images and key words/phrases) and using them as a tool to connect our faith to our learning. Students were challenged to show what they know about a particular science unit and use their knowledge to help them understand our God, the Creator. They were asked to answer this overarching question using their mind map: "When we study ______, what can we learn about God?" We did not write the throughlines on the mind maps, but we talked about how their responses about God were related to the throughlines posted on the bulletin board.

Grade 9 - Earlier this year, we developed writing skills (addressing specific audiences with form/word choice) by writing letters in the 'Write for Rights' campaign (Amnesty International). Students were doing the work of justice-seeking and community building by writing these letters of appeal to governments to promote human rights for individuals around the world. Just a few months ago now, Gr. 9s ran a week of 'sweet treat sales' in order to raise money to support the Society's refugee sponsorship (as you know they raised thousands for this cause). This came on the heels of our unit in social studies about Canada's immigration and refugee protection act. After learning about the objectives of the act, as well as the process refugees endure to flee difficult situations to come to Canada, they felt compelled to help out with these 2 individuals so closely connected to our community. This wasn't a 'true' FLEx project, as it was very after the fact, but it was another case of justice-seeking and community-building in practice.

We're in the midst of this in Gr. 9 social studies: they're currently learning about the stories that the market/mixed economies tell. As a part of this, the students are running small mini-corporations that sell concessions and other retail goods to the Jr. High students. They could each invest up to \$20 in their business to get it off the ground. They'll sell for 2 more weeks before calculating their investment growth and total profits. Once done, we will discuss the stories that we live out with our money with the question, 'Whose wealth is it anyway?' Then the students will investigate the work and effects of Kiva (an international micro-loan company); they'll be challenged to consider how their profits could be used to invest in REAL people, with REAL needs, that will make REAL impact (and they get a REAL return on their investment). Some choose to...some don't. The real idea is for them to consider how they view their 'stuff' and what are the 'stories' our lives tell with the use of our wealth.

Over the years, I've had students make literally hundreds of micro-loans to fund the livelihoods of real people...just using their relatively measly profits from a business project.

Language Arts 9 - We spend a couple of weeks researching and understanding the Canadian residential school system through the story of Chanie Wenjack, as told in the Secret Path graphic novel and soundtrack. After learning some of the history (truth), students attempt to imagine a Canada going through and achieving reconciliation. In their project, they need to convey the need to understand the truth of what has occurred (and the ongoing effects) and the difficult task of working for reconciliation between indigenous and non-indigenous Canadians.

Social Studies 9 - In the development of their business venture, students need to provide a clear explanation of their business ethics, the foundational principles that their business is built on. Students also need to choose a local charity to support and what percentage of their profits will go to their chosen charity. While they are learning about how a business' ethics and values can influence consumers, they are also analyzing how to use their financial success to impact their local community.

Grade 1 - Part of our storyline in Grade 1 is that each child will know that they are a child of God, that He loves all of us, and that we are invited to play a part of His Great Story! As we explored the color wheel this year, we wondered if we could find all these colors outside. Out we went to explore and enjoy creation. Students reflected that of course all the colors were outside; God made them in the first place! In PE the students did weekly nature walks enjoying God's creation and thinking of ways to take care of it. We also explored ways in which we could be community builders and servant workers in our families during our Belonging unit. Students thought about how to help and serve others and discussed different ways they could do this at home. Back in class we discussed the things we had tried. During class discussions we began to understand that God intended this from the beginning and that sin has changed this BUT with the Holy Spirit's help every day, we can make a change as we continue to reflect God's Image. One of our FLEX projects in Grade 1 was making Christmas cards for Seniors in nursing homes. After talking about our families and how thankful we were for God to put us in one, it came up that some people don't get to live with their families and may be lonely. Students put a great deal of work into creating cards with art and writing in their best printing to share the message of Christmas and joy. It was very thrilling to see students' enthusiasm for writing as they realized that writing is not just a skill we need to practice at school, but a powerful tool that can be used for God's glory.

Restorative Practices

The Society has supported ECS teachers in being trained in Restorative Practice over the past many years. Not only has it informed and guided our discipline practices at ECS we have used the philosophy to create community. Here are some of the many ways circles are used to creative

positive relationships and maintain a classroom atmosphere conducive to learning and student safety:

- Classroom circles
 - Checking-in, -out
 - Developing class norms (co-creating expectations for a safe and welcoming space and classroom community)
 - Conflict resolution identifying harmful behaviours, seeking forgiveness, moving towards healing and healthy boundaries
 - Identifying lagging skills and maladaptive behavior
 - using circles to be proactive; building, repairing, and strengthening relationships/interactions and solving problems
